Theater of Possibility: Celebrating Neurodiversity

Adult Master Class



Facilitating Meaningful Inclusion in Neurodiverse Classrooms

Theater of Possibility ("TOP") explores relationship skills through acting, improvisation and collaboration. Normally offered for youth, this weekend intensive Master Class is geared toward teachers, therapists and other adults who want to learn a valuable technique for enhancing communication skills and fostering

meaningful inclusion. We'll cover TOP's particular application of drama therapy and acting techniques to young people with disabilities, particularly autism spectrum. The workshop will guide participants through a typical 12-week curriculum, culminating in a final sharing for invited and public audience.

- Imaginative, playful and non-didactic
- Theater activities designed to highlight relationships skills, such as experience sharing, social referencing, nonliteral thinking, perspective taking, flexibility, collaboration and leadership.
- Techniques from Augusto Boal's Theater of the Oppressed, including:
 - Image Theater (sculpting images with our bodies)
 - o Forum Theater or "Come Step in my Shoes" (role play different solutions to a conflict)
 - Rainbow of Desire (exploring the "rainbow" of emotions in a given situation)
 - Cop in the Head (hearing and responding to internal criticism)
- Easily adapted to the living room or classroom
- Breakout sessions to discuss adaptations for different ages and functional abilities.

Who: Teachers, Therapists, Counselors, Students, Parents and Adults with Asperger's/Autism Spectrum or other ability differences. Participants must be able to participate independently

in structured group activities and should feel comfortable talking about disabilities.
