Do you sometimes feel that you're putting on an act to conform to societal norms, or have you just given up trying? Are you feeling misunderstood and frustrated by interactions with parents, teachers, coworkers or friends? Do you have friends? How can you be yourself and find acceptance on this crowded planet?

Theater of Possibility ("TOP") helps young people be themselves more fully and authentically and give voice to their ideas and dreams. Through acting, improvisation, collaboration and play-creation, we explore the dynamics of friendship, family and school. With our primary focus on creativity and collaboration, TOP offers tools to better understand relationship dynamics and be empowered, but rather than deign to teach you how to conform

to social norms, we aim to give you a voice to teach the world. Along the way, we shape powerful emotions and ideas into moving, profound and funny student-created works of theater!

Lauren Goldman Marshall (director) has worked in Seattle as a playwright and theater director since the late 1980s. She served as Co-Artistic Director and Producing Artistic Director of Seattle Public Theater from 1995–96 and 1997–2001, before stepping down to start a family. Through SPT's acclaimed Theater of Liberation program, she worked with youth to explore strategies for conflict resolution and empowerment. Lauren has written award-winning plays and video scripts for groups such as Empty Space Theatre, Village Theatre, Aids Impact, Lummi Nation and the Aids Prevention Theater Troupe. She is the author of the hit Seattle musical revue Waiter, There's a

Slug in My Latté and currently is one of six local artists selected to develop new musicals in the New Works program at the Fifth Avenue Theatre. She has also directed numerous plays and musicals for small professional and community theaters. Lauren co-founded Aspire Girls, a social group for girls with Asperger's, and Theater of Possibility. She has degrees from Stanford (BA, JD) and New York University (MFA).

Theater of Possibility, which was started in 2010, uses techniques adapted from Theater of the Oppressed, developed by Brazilian theater artist and activist Augusto Boal, whose methods are used around the world for social activism, community-building, therapy and education.



Scholarships: Thanks to a grant from the Seattle Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs, TOP is able to offer need-based scholarships to students, grades 6-12, living in Seattle. Those outside Seattle may receive non-grant-based partial scholarships as space permits.
